Breeders Guidelines

BREEDERS GUIDELINES

These guidelines apply to the three varieties of Poodles. "The breeder of a dog is the person who owned the dam of that dog when the dam was bred;...", according to Section 1, Chapter 3 of AKC's Rules on Registration.

The owner of the female makes the decision to breed and selects the stud dog to use. Of course, the owner of the stud dog always has the right to refuse to breed any female.

Among the many reasons to breed a Poodle, the best one of all is reflected by the first stated purpose of the Poodle Club of America (PCA): "to encourage the 'breeding' of purebred Poodles to bring their natural qualities to perfection." One of the purposes of the Illustrated Study of the Poodle Breed Standard published by PCA is to promote a better understanding of the attributes of the "perfect" Poodle. This is what all reputable breeders strive to achieve in every litter.

You DO NOT have to breed your Poodle to be a Poodle fancier. Many, many people are happy to purchase their Poodles, enjoy them and leave the breeding to others. Responsible breeding for those who decide to breed Poodles requires more than simply complying with AKC rules and understanding the breed standard. A breeder must understand and recognize Poodle type.

Both stud dog and brood bitch should be of good quality and not have any serious faults. If either has a major fault or is unsound, mentally or physically, it should NOT be bred. The objective of the selection of the dogs to be bred should always be to produce puppies that are of better quality than the parents.

Careful examination of the pedigrees of both parents should reveal no genetic disorders or defects. Some of the genetic problems that can be detected by tests are listed below. Inquire about the results of the genetic testing and problems that the brood bitch or stud dog and their litter mates may have produced. Obtain copies of certification numbers of the genetic tests completed (CERF-Canine Eye Registration Foundation; OFA-Orthopedic Foundation for Animals; etc.), including the dates of the tests.

Following are some of the tests that should be done BEFORE you even consider using your Poodle for breeding.

The above information should help you decide if your Poodle should be used for breeding. You should learn all you can about the genetic background of your dog. Ask the breeders for input on each dog in his pedigree. Ask what genetic testing has been done and the results of the tests. Many of the genetic problems in dogs are caused by recessive genes.
